God is so faithful! Time and time again I see this at school and at home. This year the Race for Education is off to a wonderful start....\$28,004.70 has been raised as of Friday, February 26. BMS was even blessed to have a supporter walk into the office and hand deliver a check for the Race. When asked which students he wished to have the money credited to, he replied, he wasn't sponsoring anyone; he just wanted it to go to the general Race fund. This man had not received a yellow sponsorship letter but felt lead to help Belleville Mennonite in this manner. This is truly God's leading!

What a joy it is to see the students running to help their school and so much more to have parents and grandparents come to watch and join in the excitement. Thank you for being involved in this event. As of Thursday, we have had 128 students run their Race and the remaining students will run this week.

Thursday, March 4 is the final day for students to run in the Race for Education. Since snow and high winds cancelled school last Friday, we will have two groups of students running Thursday afternoon. Grades 9 & 10 will run at 12:45 and grades 11 & 12 will run at 1:45.

The senior class is currently in the lead with \$215 raised per student followed closely by 8th grade with \$205 raised per student. Grades 4 - 11 will celebrate with pizza parties on Friday, March 5 for having 100% participation.

Thank you to all who have sponsored students in the Race and thank you to those who are continuing to send in donations. We are very blessed to have your support as we educate our students in God's word.

# ANNOUNCEMENTS

**The Third Graders** began a chapter study on the different types of resources on Earth (renewable, nonrenewable, and reusable) in mid January. The students were very eager to learn and grasped the concepts rather easily. After students began to realize the importance of recycling and how to conserve resources wisely, we began a 15 day recycling lab that allowed the students to bring in any paper, plastic, or aluminum products from their homes to be recycled. We wanted to see how many pounds of paper, plastic, and aluminum we could recycle rather than throw away and fill up the landfills in Mifflin County. After the 15 days of the lab, students were able to recycle 58 pounds of paper, 48 pounds of plastic, and 22 pounds of aluminum. These numbers are fantastic given that we only have 11 students in class this year. Praise God for our students willingness to be good stewards of our Earth and see the value of recycling and conserving resources.

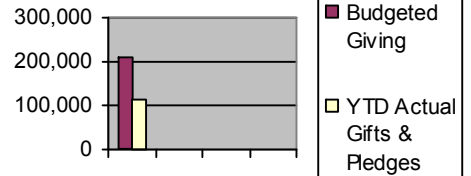

**Stuffed Burgers**

- 1 to 1 1/2 pound hamburger
- 1 - 4 oz. can mushrooms
- 4 slice cheddar cheese or your favorite
- 4 teaspoons A-1 sauce
- Garlic powder
- Salt
- Pepper
- Emeril's Seasoning

Make 8 thin patties. On four of the patties sprinkle garlic powder, salt, pepper and Emeril's seasoning, add 1/4 of the mushrooms to each, 1 teaspoon A-1 sauce and top with cheese. Place a second patty over the first and pinch the edges shut. Carefully place in a skillet or on the grill to cook turning once. Enjoy with your favorite toppings! Can add grilled onions to the center too.

## *Administration*

Dear BMS Family and Friends,

I am pleased to inform you that just yesterday I was informed that BMS was selected to receive a MJPATH grant designed to help BMS students improve their physical health. These funds will enable us to expand upon, and further, the initiatives of the Highmark Healthy High 5 grant we have implemented during the current school year.

The purpose of our initiative is to encourage our students to be physically active outside of their normal physical education classes. Our first target group is students who do not participate in extracurricular athletics at BMS. Our second target group are those students who currently participate in school related athletic programs during the fall and winter seasons, but aren't able to do so after February as we do not currently offer any varsity or junior varsity level sports during the spring. Our objectives are as follows:

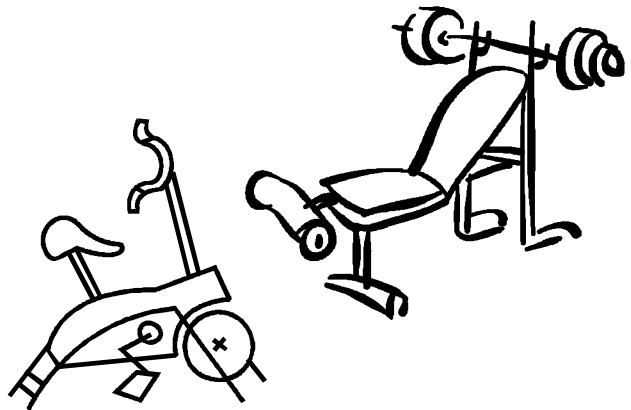
- to encourage students to be physically active outside of their normal physical education classes
- to allow students who currently participate in school related athletic programs to improve their muscular strength and cardiovascular endurance by providing a place to work on physical fitness during the off-season
- to encourage the faculty/staff at Belleville Mennonite School to lead by example in terms of physical fitness through use of our fitness room

The MJPATH grant will enable us to do several things. First, these funds will allow us to add to the equipment purchased through the Highmark Healthy High 5 grant. Our major purchase will be an elliptical bike (which would provide the opportunity for a greatly increased number of individuals to improve their cardiovascular health), along with some smaller equipment purchases. Second, these funds will allow us to start an after school "BMS Fitness Club." This would give our students an incentive to stay after school and improve their physical fitness. The funds would be used to pay a staff member to stay after school for an hour and a half, three days per week in order to supervise and be an advisor for the club. We also plan to purchase t-shirts for those individuals who are involved in the club and participate on a regular basis for the remainder of the school year.

I want to thank MJPATH and the United Way for providing funds which will help us to make available additional opportunities to improve physical health amongst the student body. It is, but one example, of how we seek to more effectively minister to the whole person (spirit, mind, and body) here at BMS.

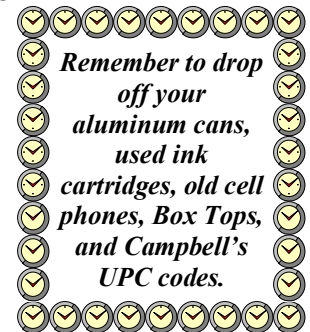
